This year's Learn-to-Row programme is nearly finished and despite the rather bad weather it has been a great deal of fun. As always, the group is a really diverse bunch of lovely people, but I am confident we can slot them all into our existing groups in line with their rowing ambitions. The Learn-to-Row program is a huge commitment in terms of time and organisational effort, and I am very grateful to Deb and all of our volunteer supporters who make this a safe and enjoyable experience for all.

There is much more I could say about all the wonderful people who help with the running of our club, and I hope that the coming festive season will give me an opportunity to do just that. In the meantime, it goes without saying that we do appreciate each and every one of you.
