# Union Street: when they named a street after the rowing club


From the URC archive...

The Avon Loop nowadays bears no resemblance to the thriving community that lived there pre-earthquakes. Even our esteemed Club Captain flatted in the Loop for a time! Now as part of the Red Zone, nearly all the housing has been levelled with only grass and shrubbery remaining.


The old Union Rowing Club building was at the centre of the Loop from 1896, serving as the club base for 60 years until the move to the Reach in 1957.

What is now Bangor Street - which runs through the centre of the Loop - was called Union Street until a name change in 1948. Neighbouring Avon Street lost its naming rights in the same year, becoming Hurley St.









Saturday 17 October dawned warm and still for the annual bridge to bridge event.

Boating Club stalwart and event organiser Peter Midgley wrong after he had boldly predicted at the pre-race meeting that the front would come through immediately after the race had finished. Swap "finished" for "started", and you've hit the nail on the head. The first crews away rowed the two kilometre stretch to the mouth of the Kaiapoi River to be greeted by surging white caps on the Waimak and the umpire boat calling the race off. # Union's second home: the D'Arcy Christopher Shed at Kaiapoi



It's been a long time coming, after a shed was first suggested as a Kaiapoi base for the club after the Kerrs Reach facility was seriously damaged in the 2011 and 2012 earthquakes. The Total Span shed was purchased several years ago, but getting it on site proved challenging, requiring protracted discussions with various parties including the neighbouring croquet club, the Waimakiriri District Council and E Can. President Neville Youngman has led the lengthy negotiations and it's largely to his credit that the shed is finally on site.

The shed is named after a long time Union Rowing Club benefactor who left a trust fund for the club's benefit.

## Q AND A: UNION at MASTERS NATIONALS



#### What was it like?

Contrasting days as the photos show! Sunday delivered perfect cool conditions, but Saturday was a struggle for much of the day with temperatures that would not have been out of place on a skifield. Our total number of 31 rowers was nearly double that from the last time we competed at nationals in 2013, plus our club officials and loyal supporters put the total at over 50+.



### How did we go?

Very well! - 26 medals, exactly double what we achieved at nationals in 2013: 5 golds [2013] v 10 golds [2015]; 5 silvers [2013] /v 10 silvers [2015]; and 3 bronzes [2013] /v 6 bronzes [2015].
